ART: ARCHITECTURE

Situated in a striking listed building by architect Ernö Goldfinger, the Belgravia Gallery was the perfect setting for an exhibition combining art and architecture

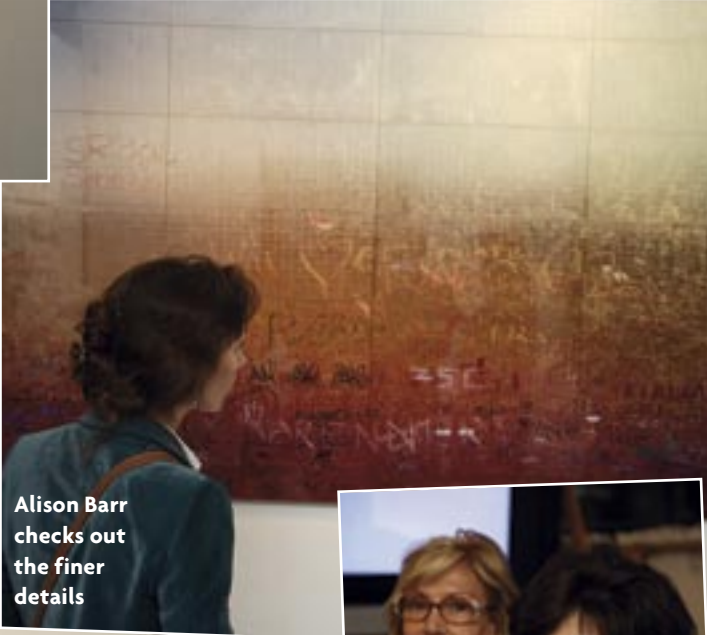

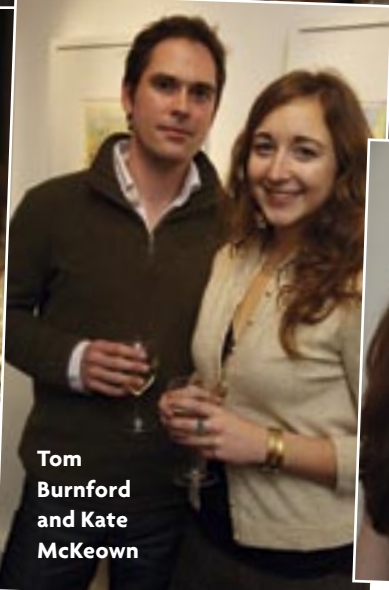

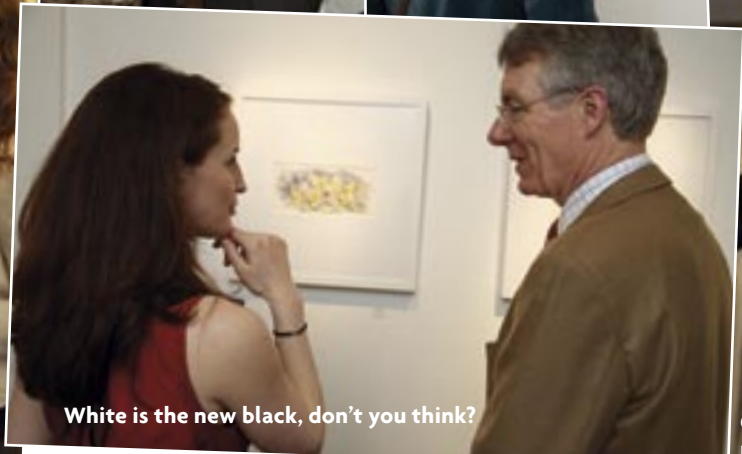
